SMOKE-FREE WORKPLACES

Today, with the growing awareness of the danger of secondhand smoke, more workers are being protected by **legislation and policies banning smoking at work.**

SMOKING IN THE WORKPLACE

Raises operational costs

and reduces productivity by negatively impacting the health of workers

Has a direct impact on non-smokers and exposes them to secondhand smoke

Increases workplace cleaning and maintenance costs

Increases the risk of fire and accidental injuries

The CDC estimates that **each employee** who smokes costs an extra \$1,760 per year in lost productivity.

WHAT EMPLOYERS SHOULD DO

Employers can **reduce absenteeism** by enacting a smoke-free workplace policy.

In Nevada, businesses or venues that are excluded from the Nevada Clean Indoor Air Act may implement voluntary policies to prohibit the use of e-cigarettes or vaping products.

In Nevada, businesses or venues can **implement minimum distance policies** to limit secondhand smoke exposure outside of their businesses.

BENEFITS OF SMOKE-FREE WORKPLACES

According to the WHO, seven out of ten smokers want to quit and admit that a smoke-free workplace would provide a supportive



environment for employees trying to quit.

As a considerable percentage of the population spend most of their time at work, the workplace can be used to i**nform and educate workers** about the dangers of environmental tobacco smoke.

A smoke-free workplace can be the first step in a series of wellness initiatives geared towards creating a **happier**, **healthier**, **more productive workplace culture**.

Smoke-free environments help **de-normalize**

the act of smoking and provide an environment conducive for smokers to kick the habit.

Middle-aged adults who work in a smoke-free workplace have a lower risk of diseases such as heart attack, heart failure, and

stroke, when compared to their counterparts working in environments that allow smoking.
